As you begin to read these words, our Annual Meeting will have passed and I will have shared with you my reflection of not only the past ten months but some of my thoughts for the next year. It is hard to imagine that our short time together has flown by so quickly . . . and yet, we have accomplished much since I appeared on the doorstep last March.

So, we first need to stop and give ourselves thanks and appreciation. Many of you have worked hard to keep up with me, to slow me down, and to walk with me as I learned of the ways of St. Paul's. There are too many folks for me to thank in this article, but I do want to acknowledge both Mark Rudd and Sue LeDuc. These two have led you well as your wardens; they have offered me tremendous guidance, have held my hand, laughed at my feeble jokes, and dried my tears in those rare moments. This is a good congregation and we have much to be proud of, so let us rejoice in all that we have, all that we do, and all that God is calling us to be.

And as we give thanks, let us not forget that we still have more to do. We are in the midst of a significant transition . . . our financial challenges have forced us into a place to look at how we do things, how we spend the financial gifts we receive from all of you, and how we respond to the needs of God's people both inside and outside of our doors. There is a sense of urgency around this – for many years we have relied upon our savings or the gracious bequests to offset our expenses. But we are unable to do that any longer. We will now look carefully at each expenditure . . . we will ask these questions before each purchase "Does this create and nurture relationships with God and each other?" "Does this expense invite others to invest in God's kingdom in Lansing?" You will be receiving regular updates regarding our finances and some of the options Vestry considers along the way. As the year progresses, we may need to make some difficult choices about our expenses and it is important you share in that information.

In September, we will celebrate the 100th anniversary of our church building. This is a great opportunity to look back and see what the saints before us had hoped for and accomplished through both good times and bad. But this is an even greater opportunity for us to look toward

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the next 100 years – to gather together in faithfulness and tremendous hope wondering and dreaming into being what the next decades will be for us and those who follow in our footsteps.

So, next on our list . . . to continue to celebrate and rejoice in all that we are as St. Paul's. To continue to grow spiritually and faithfully through formation, fellowship and worship. To intentionally invite others to join our community and be part of the kingdom of God. To engage the use of social media so we may communicate clearly with those of other generations. To be a community of

To generate the resources needed to engage in God's ministry while carefully expending those gifts in the most judicious way possible. Treasurer's Report Information as of December 31, 2013

As of this writing, the 2013 accounting was not final. The financial reports for 2013 will be presented at the parish's annual meeting.

However some highlights for 2013 can reported.

On a positive note, over \$321,000 of pledge revenue was booked in 2013. That is \$26,000 more than budgeted.

However, significantly more money was spent then collected. As a result it was necessary to use \$80,000 of Perpetual Fund money in 2013.

We also used \$58,000 from other restricted funds. Included in that amount is \$21,000 from the Shawver fund to support the salary of the Youth Coordinator and \$18,000 from the Memorial Fund for sanctuary improvements including, carpeting, draperies and the altar improvements.

The restricted funds received \$29,000 in contribution in 2013. The restricted funds also recorded \$108,000 in investment earnings in 2013.

The Capital Campaign spent \$222,000 in 2013. This includes completion of the metal roof project, a tuck point project and installation of a new security and phone system.

The Capital Campaign has collected over \$426,000 in contributions since it started in 2011. As we enter the final year of pledge payments an additional \$114,000 is expected to be collected in 2014.

There was not sufficient cash in the Capital Campaign Fund to complete all of the projects that needed to be completed in 2013. Accordingly the Vestry approved a \$75,000 loan from the Perpetual Fund to the Capital Campaign. This loan is intended to be repaid as parishioners pay their Capital Campaign pledge payments. As of December 31, 2013, \$35,465 of the loan was repaid to the Perpetual Fund leaving the balance of the loan from the Perpetual Fund at \$39,535 at year end.

Going in to the year 2014 we are looking at deficit operating budget.

The current draft of the 2014 operating budget shows a deficit of approximately \$150,000. The safety net of the perpetual fund is expected to have \$90,000 available. This includes repayment of the Capital campaign loan noted above.

The Vestry has been working on this issue and has identified many innovative and creative ideas to address the deficit. We are confident that with the support of the whole congregation we will resolve our financial deficit.

For 31 Years St. Paul's Altar Guild Has Supported Programs for the Needy!

Lavina Miles-Alice Jennings Fund distribution began in 1982 Mrs. Lavina Miles, a member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, included a donation to the Altar Guild within her will in 1968. Mrs. Alice Jennings, a long time member of St. Paul's Episcopal Church Altar

Guild, also included a donation within her will. The resulting Lavina Miles-Alice Jennings Fund is a restricted asset of St. Paul's. In 1982, the Altar Guild, working with the Rector, began disbursing annual fund growth so these women's donations could "be in turn given to the needy" in according with their wishes.

Through this fund years over \$39,000 has been donated to help with various needs in our community. During the past 31 years, donations have been made to: Advent House, Consumer Energy People Care Project, Economic Crisis/Haven House, Eve's House, Harvest House, Lansing Food Bank, Lansing Habitat for Humanity, Lansing Rescue Mission, Loaves and Fishes, Maplewood Center, Salvation Army Energy Fund, Youth Haven Ranch, and Volunteers of America-New Hope Center. In addition to these community efforts donations have been made to St. Paul's Clergy Discretionary funds, St. Paul's Christmas & Thanksgiving Baskets, St. Paul's rotating shelter program, St Paul's street ministry, St. Paul's England Chorister scholarships, and St. Paul's Youth Ministry program.

In 2013 over \$900 each was given to Maplewood Women's Center, Loaves and Fishes and Rev. Karen's discretionary fund. In addition to the fund distribution, the Altar Guild collects toiletries (many from motel / hotel visits) at the holiday time for distribution to Lansing area shelters.

One World, Many Stories






Why should children be reading fiction instead of Bible stories?

Good literature can vividly confirm and nurture knowledge of what is good and true. Good fiction allows us to vicariously experience conflicts between good and evil and thereby grow in wisdom. Jesus used parables to teach his disciples.

A good story inspires, instructs, and opens up new worlds of interest and activity. A child's character and beliefs can be deeply strengthened by the books they read.

Here are lectionary links for two books (or movies) that you probably have in your home library—Charlie and the Chocolate Factory and Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone.

Year A: 5th Sunday after Epiphany



First Reading: Deuteronomy 30:15-20

Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl

Comment: In today's text, we hear that following God's commandments leads to prosperity and life in the Promised Land; the outcome is not so hopeful for those who disobey. "But if your heart turns away and you do not hear... you shall not live long in the land that you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess." For the children with golden tickets, Willy Wonka's Chocolate Factory might just be the Promised Land. They too make choices that carry consequences. Augustus Gloop, Violet Beauregarde, Veruca Salt, and Mike Teavee find their time in the factory cut short because

of their greed and unwillingness to follow Mr. Wonka's instructions. Soon, only the timid, loving, obedient Charlie Bucket and his grandpa remain; because of Charlie's actions, he is given the chocolate factory, where he and his family are invited to live for the rest of their lives.



Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 3:1-9

Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone by J.K. Rowling

Comment: "The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose... we are God's servants, working together." Paul is explaining to the Corinthians that his work is not in competition with Apollo's, but that each person's task is part of what it takes to serve God. In the church people may have different jobs—teaching, cooking, cleaning, counting money, etc.—yet everyone is working together for God's purposes. In Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone, Harry and his friends work together to keep the Sorcerer's Stone from the Dark Side. It takes Ron's skills

at chess, Hermione's logic, and Harry's nerve and courage to help them accomplish their purpose.
