A Good Story

As a child, I often thought of Lent as a time to endure . . . a time to pass through as quickly as possible so that I could get to the good stuff. You see, Easter was a big deal in my family. Not because of chocolate bunnies (whose ears we bit off) or the Easter egg hunt which would result in numerous upset tummies after consuming in rapid progression those small little marshmallow chicks. Not because I had a new dress, a new hat, new patent leather shoes and new gloves to wear. The big deal was that on Easter morning, we children would receive one new bicycle.

Now, not one for every child mind you, but one for all of us to share. There were five of us — and four of us were of the age and physical capability to ride a two-wheeler. But for whatever reason (which I now understand was simply economics), there was one new bike and four of us. My parents never dictated to whom the new bike would go, rather it was for us to work out amongst ourselves. You can imagine how that went . . . some pushing and shoving . . . some yelling and hair pulling . . . but eventually we always came to the conclusion that it was something we needed to share.

Why the bike story, you ask? No good reason really, except that it makes for a good story. And Easter is a good story... the best we have in the Christian tradition. But... to get to the really good story, we have to go through, you guessed it... Lent.

I no longer find Lent something that I have to endure to get to the good stuff. Rather Lent, in and of itself, is part of the good story. It is the narrative that builds to the grand ending. For without Lent, Easter would just be another Sunday. As you know, each Sunday of the year is the Day of the Lord's Resurrection. It is Lent that makes Easter so extraordinarily special.

I wonder how each of us will make Lent part of the good story. For some of our members, they will use this time to prepare for confirmation or reception into the Episcopal Church. Some of

Treasurer's Report Information as of January 31, 2014

January 31, 2014 is 8.3% of the year. Pledge income was \$33,664 in January which is 11.6% of the 2014 budget. However \$10,541 of that amount is pledges that were paid in 2013 for the year 2014.

Operations had a net loss for the month of January of \$2,991. In addition in January the market value of the designated and restricted funds lost \$9,081 in value.

Many of you know that I was an

When I ask myself, how did I keep my spiritual and mental health, I know the answer: my belief in God's love and promise to us and this community of faith of St. Paul's. I know I would falter

by myself. But the countless acts of kindness and support that are a part of us and the quiet and steadfast service of many of you always comfort me. I see the promise and God's love lived out here every day.

That, to me, is certainly one of the central parts of our identity as a parish. It is a gift we have to offer. We have many gifts; come join us as we work to find our identity as a community of faithful in this new century.

Lent and the Liturgy for Lent

The paschal mystery of the dying and rising again of Jesus Christ and our participation therein is the theological core of the gospel, and its liturgical celebration is the central event of the church year.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning season of repentance, penitence, reflection, contemplation, fasting and self-denial. Our liturgy on this day has its roots in the Old Testament, where covering oneself with sackcloth and ashes was a sign of repentance and mourning. Early Christians also used sackcloth and ashes as a sign of their repentance. The imposition of ashes during this service is intended to give ceremonial embodiment to the theme of penitence. Ash Wednesday was also the day public penitents were admitted to their penitential discipline, so that they might be readmitted to communion before Easter. Taken together, these rites remind us that we stand before God as sinners doomed to die, and that it is only through God's merciful gift that we can hope for anything else.

Since the early days of the Church, Lent has been a time of preparation for deeper commitment to Christ (the preparation of baptismal candidates) and a time of renewal and rededication to the promises made in our Baptismal Covenant. I offer you the following for reflection so that your Lent may be a holy experience.

Repentance

The prophet Joel sounds the call in the Old Testament Lesson on Ash Wednesday, "Turn back to me with your whole heart . . . turn back to the Lord your God; for he is gracious and compassionate, long-suffering and ever constant, always ready to repent of the threatened evil." (Joel 2:12-13). Lent is a time of conscious turning to the Lord in honest and sincere ways. It is a time of reaffirming previous

conversion experiences and with renewed vigor, to set Christ and the things of God as the central focus of your life. Lent is a time to re-establish priorities. What are your priorities and do they reflect God's presence in our life?

Penitence

When we consciously turn to God, we know we are mortal, frail, weak, and not in complete control of ourselves. We know that we have, in the words of St. Paul, "sinned and fallen short of the glory of God." And so as a mark of the sincerity of our repentance we confess our sins, examine our consciences, deal with the dark side of our lives and seek God's forgiveness. What are the sins which need confessing so that you might feel the overwhelming love of God's forgiveness and grace?

Reflection

We take time in Lent to reflect on the Word of God in scripture through regular worship and participation in the sacramental life of the Church, as the special means of grace. We study . . . we pray . . . we meditate . . . we listen for God! In Lent we make a special effort to clear our minds of unimportant things and think about ultimate things: sin and redemption; freedom from our idols; our separation from God and our salvation; death and resurrection. What are those things that clutter your mind and use your energy that prevent you from focusing on God and our salvation?

Simplicity

Lent is a special season and calls forth the need for austerity to reflect the themes of penitence. The music, the liturgies, the simplicity of the altar setting clearly state that Lent is a time when there are changes from our normal way of doing things in the Sunday liturgy.

Worship in Lent

The First Sunday of Lent begins with The Great Litany. The gateway to

Easter joy is the acknowledgement of our limitations and the seeking of forgiveness. It is one of the chief ways we prepare for Easter. The Great Litany has been used in the Church for centuries. Today, we join our Christian brothers and sisters who have gone before us as we pray this litany.

Sunday liturgy for Lent 2 through Lent 5

The remaining Sunday liturgies in Lent will begin with the Penitential Order. This draws our attention to our sinful nature and need for God's forgiveness.

Silence

Significant periods of silence will be observed during the service. The service will begin with a silent procession after having prepared our hearts for worship in the silence following the organ prelude. Silence will be observed following the Sermon and during the Prayers of the People. In a noisy world like ours, silence is truly golden and an important part of our liturgy.

I invite all of you into a holy Lent – to consider this a time of change and growth; a time to reflect on your faith life and your commitment to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; a time to prepare yourself to receive God's grace as one of his children, holy and beloved. May all of you find newness of life and forgiveness of sins during our forty days of Lent.

Christ Child Gifts: Hearts opened as St. Paul's folks decorated the cloister Advent Tree with bright, warm, useful baby items delivered Christmas week to the Small Children's Clothes Closet at Pilgrim Congregational Church, a Christian Services Ministry. Closet Coordinators express deep appreciation to our congregation for these gifts and write, "Because of churches like yours we were able to provide clothing and other items for 322 infants and small children in 2013. We thank you for your continuing support of this very important community outreach program in the

Greater Lansing Area."

Death, Resurection and Hope

The Christian faith is based simply upon hope. If we do not have hope, we might as well pack our bags and go. But how do we find hope in a time of despair? Where is hope when a loved one has died; a cherished friend is no longer a friend; a dream no longer is possible; a beloved rector retires; a job is lost?

We experience death on a daily basis. Not of the bodily form necessarily, but in the loss of things that once were important to us. Where is hope in death? How do we move forward

through the grief of loss into the realm of hope? What does resurrection have to do with all of this?

Join me on Wednesday evenings at 6:30 PM beginning March 12th for a series of conversations on death, resurrection and hope. During this five week series we will look at death through scripture and tradition – we will ponder the struggle of grief leading to transformation and resurrection through the lens of hope. We will ponder not only the deaths we experience as individuals but also the

death a worshipping community lives through during times of change.

For those of you who wish to gather earlier, we can engage in our theology-on-tap conversations when you are encouraged to ask the priest whatever is on your mind (within reason).
