Clergy Report

I begin this article by first expressing my thanks to Hillary for her graciousness in not nagging me about missing the deadline for this month's edition. Writing this article was way low on the priority list during Holy Week. Although I am sure I could have found the time to write, there was too much of my brain space being utilized for our journey with Jesus into death and new life.

Here, on Easter Monday morning, I feel a tremendous sense of relief for having completed the week. Yes, the workload is a heavier one than usual. But even greater than the feeling of relief, is the tremendous sense of joy I have for the many who were my companions with me for those seven emotional days. To travel together through Jesus's last days – the intimate supper with his closest friends as he says good-bye and expresses his deep love through the washing of feet – the horror of a lonely gruesome death – the exultation of his new life – to experience this together is the ultimate gift of God's love lived through our life together.

Such a journey is only possible with the hard work and involvement of so many – the altar guild's constant presence and patience as I changed my mind time and time again – the many who served God's altar as chalice bearers and acolytes – the lectors who read, and read, and read the long scripture readings that lead us together on this journey of Word and Sacrament – the various choirs whose voices and instruments helped us ascend to God's holy place on Easter morning while only days earlier Vicky's voice led us gently, persistently, to the place of sadness and mourning on Good Friday. Then there were our children who traveled the Stations of the Cross – tasting gall, touching the crown of thorns, and wiping the faces of their beloved parents with wet cloths. Their wonder and questions were those that we adults were silently asking. The many who made our Maundy Thursday meal a time of companionship and sharing – good food and good friends sharing their stories, much like Jesus did with his disciples.

This journey of Holy Week was not only Jesus's, it was ours. To live into the darkness of not knowing what is next, but trusting that Jesus's light will show us the way. For it is in the midst of darkness that we discover who we truly are and whose we are. In the darkness, we are wholly dependent on each other and God for the strength and courage to take the next step. In the dark, we must hold hands, trust each other, stay connected, and rely on each other, knowing that the light of Christ will shine at extraordinary moments to show us the way.

My sincere thanks to all who accompany me in the dark. I am blessed to be in community with all of you. Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

I had had a long Saturday...first making palm crosses and setting up the altar for Palm Sunday...always a joy....then spending time with my 96-year-old mother...also a joy but mixed with melancholy...then working on my taxes...never a joy... and I looked at the clock: 4:00 p.m. I didn't really want to go "Mobile in Black and White", but I had signed up to bring a salad so I got everything together and left once again for St. Paul's.

The dinner was our usual great pot luck and then we all trooped to Dart Auditorium and the showing of Rob Gray's film as part of the Capitol City Film Fest. I admit that I am not a film fest "afficionado" although there are a number of local film festivals. I left Dart Auditorium stunned: Rob and his crew had portrayed the face of racism in 21st century America.

The tone was quiet but the evidence was overwhelming. And Rob is right...it is Lansing as well as Mobile...because racism is inherent in many of the structures that make up a large part of our lives together...including the church sometimes. Any attorney who has worked in the criminal justice system recognizes it if he or she is honest. In fact, "Mobile in Black and White" is "exhibit A" that many of us are still kidding ourselves about race, poverty, segregation, and rights. These are issues that can be overwhelming.

On the way home, I thought about St. Paul's and our search for vision. We are in the process of building a community. It will be a community structured in love. With God's grace, it will be a community where we can discuss issues in safety and find ways to respond to challenges with courage and love and to turn that message outward.

Treasurer's Report Information as of March 31, 2014

We are three months into the year 2014 and our financial situation is developing as was expected per the operating budget for 2014.

- People are fulfilling their pledge commitments and we have received over 29% of the 2014 pledges.
- Over \$45,000 has been collected on capital campaign pledges in 2014.
- The capital campaign loan from the Perpetual Fund has been repaid in full.
- However, as projected by the 2014 budget, we have spent more than we collected so far in 2014.
- At the end of March 2014 we spent \$44,000 more than we've had in revenue.
- We have already taken \$40,000 from the Perpetual Fund because of this deficit.
- Currently the Perpetual Fund has a little more than \$50,000 available.
- The Vestry has held special meetings to address our financial situation and will be presenting their plans at a parish meeting on May 4.

Good books for children are a rich and untapped resource for proclaiming and interpreting Christian faith for ALL ages. Books can be a bridge to a faith- expanding experience.
