Where Do We Go From Here?

n Thursday, December 10, the vestry met with Jim Gettel, Canon for Congregational Life for the diocese. We wanted to discuss where we are in the transition process of preparing for and calling a permanent rector. As much as we all think we know what the process is, we can all benefit from hearing about it and separating fact from supposition. We (the vestry) certainly made the most of this opportunity...it was a long meeting. But no question was too "dumb" or too "obvious" to ask. So let me share with you some of what we learned.

Jim explained to us that a "priest-in-charge" is in the middle between an interim priest (who is temporary and may not become a permanent rector) and a permanent rector (who has a tenured position). A vestry may call the priest-in-charge to become permanent rector, with the bishop's permission.

The priest-in-charge helps prepare and strengthen the parish community for the next stages of our journey together. We have done some very practical work; for example, making our budget sustainable and backing it up with strong stewardship this year. We are also working at discerning where we are going as a community:

(1) Who is God calling us to be as a community?

Where are we?

What are we here for?

(2) How will we respond to God's call?

We have come a long way in this process as well. The results of our "Visioning" have been turned over to a task force to analyze and set some priorities. We will hear more of that in the new year.

We are discerning what we need from ourselves and our clergy to move us towards the future into which we believe God is calling us. During this time, Priest Karen is also discerning God's call to her. We have begun a process of reflective sharing, reverent listening, and prayerful discernment, and during our meeting with Jim we asked one another about what areas and questions we still need to explore.

Based on being stronger in practical ways, and being clear about where we hope to go, we may discern to continue the journey together as priest and parish community. Key is creating a Christian community that nurtures and sustains loving interpersonal relationships. Key also is prayer. We need your help, your suggestions, but above all, your prayers.

Financial Update.

- Financial Information as of November 30, 2014
- Pledge income was \$302,385 for the eleven months ending November 30 which is 92.3% of the revised 2014 budget for pledge income. It appears reasonable to expect 100% of the budgeted pledge revenue to be collected in 2014.
- Operations had a loss for November of \$2,421 to bring the November 30 year-to-date total to a loss of \$78,800.
- In November, the market value of the designated and restricted funds increased \$9,796 for a year to date net market gain of \$50,513.
- The 2015 operating budget is being developed for presentation at the annual meeting in January. Preliminary information indicates that, through the reduction of expenses and increases in pledge commitments, the operating budget will be in much better shape than it has been for many years.

Want to Take a CPR / AED / First Aid Class?

5 t. Paul's Episcopal Church is an Authorized Provider of American Red Cross CPR/AED/First Aid classes. Thirteen persons were successfully trained in November and December. Many ushers are trained to respond should there be a medical emergency

during church services. Trained first responders are available during Church School and in the Nursery. Other members of the congregation were trained as volunteers. How about you?

Red Cross classes have been condensed and streamlined. Classes are now available online followed by a two-hour hands-on skill session with an instructor. Taking a class is not just about saving a life. It is also about knowing what to do in an emergency and how to provide basic first aid for an injury. Do you know what to do?

St. Paul's has the freedom to schedule classes at our convenience. The fee of \$30 is much less than registering through the American Red Cross (\$90) because we own four manikins, have no overhead expense, and have a volunteer instructor.

When is the next class? We will schedule one to meet your time frame when there are six to eight persons who want to take a class.



Why Celebrate Epiphany? - St. Paul's Youth Library

he joyful energy of Epiphany has always inspired games and pageants, music and meals. It's a multicultural celebration because the Three Kings who followed the star to find the Holy Child came from different cultures and continents.

Epiphany comes at the end of the Twelve Days of Christmas—on January 6.

Although American tradition

focuses on Christmas Day as the primary day to give and receive gifts, in some southern European and Latin American cultures, Epiphany is actually the accepted time for gift giving. Instead of expecting Santa Claus to deliver presents on Christmas Eve, children wait for the Three Kings to bring them gifts on Epiphany. And if, by chance, you are separated from your children (or grandchildren) on Christmas itself, you still have the chance to share this very special holiday together.

Small Camel Follows the Star by Rachel W. N. Brown

Comment: The story, told from Small Camel's perspective, is an imaginative telling of the travels of the wise men. As Small Camel carries the gifts for Jesus on his back through the desert all he can think about is that he tired and wants to go home. When he meets Jesus, he forgets how tired he is. He is filled with happiness and knows that he is truly in the presence of a king.

Where the River Begins by Thomas Locker

Comment: The opening of Genesis describes how all things began: everything was formless and void, but God was there. God is our beginning. Whatever comes after, heavens and earth, light and darkness, days and nights, all of it is rooted in God. In Where the River Begins, a boy and

his grandfather are interested in the river that runs near their home. They decide to embark on a trip to find out where the river begins. They are searching for its origins, and in the meantime, they enjoy the beauty of the river and one another's company. When we search for our origins as people of faith, we enjoy the story of Scripture and of saints who came before us, and God is through it all, speaking and creating. And when we find the beginning, we find that in the beginning was God.

Old Turtle and the Broken Truth by Douglas Wood

Comment: "He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him." In Wood's story, the truth exists in the world, but the people do not know its fullness. They grasp instead to a broken, beautiful, but not incomplete truth. Old Turtle says that the broken truth will only be mended when we see ourselves in one another. As followers of Christ, we see how this truth is mended when we see the light of Christ in one another. Jesus Christ is the truth, the Light of the World that makes God known to us.

The Beatitudes: From Slavery to Civil Rights by Carole Boston Weatherford

This is a story of African American history in the United States from slavery to present day. The author highlights 13 historical figures and shares a bit about their story through the lens of the Beatitudes. The illustrations are specific to each story shared, portraying life-like portraits and accurate accounts of the stories of each person. The book begins with an overview of African American history and the sharing of the Beatitudes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, and then carefully moves through the unique stories of the historical figures.
