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From the Rector

Shifts, New Directions, and Where Do I Look Now?

The unexpected flooding of the lower level of the music wing although problematic and a general pain in our ongoing life, also provided us with an opportunity to ponder some changes in rooms and where certain ministries and people are housed. Temporarily, those in the choir were displaced as their vesting room was moved to the lower level classroom wing – but happily they are back in their space awaiting new fixtures on which to hang their vestments.

As we prepared for the arrival of Susan Carter as our new Associate Rector, we realized the need our Needs Closet had for more space and also the need for an office for Susan – so we moved the Needs Closet into the upstairs Conference Room (which offers plenty of space and a long table for sorting) and you can now find Susan in what was once the Deacon's office. Jeff Walker discovered after two months of settling in as our new Minister of Music, he had a need for a dedicated space that offered privacy for his work, so his office will soon be located upstairs next to Susan's.

But we are not done yet! For some time we have been concerned about the location of the nursery – tucked into the corner of the lower level of the Parish Hall – about as far away as possible from the sanctuary – not easy to find for newcomers. Hopefully in a few weeks, the nursery will be moving into the space next to the Choir Room known as the Vesting Room – a space that is easy to locate and easily accessible for parents. And those who use the Vesting Room – acolytes, chalice bearers and clergy, will soon find their robes and vestments located directly below their current space in the McClintock Room – which is newly painted thanks to John David Hawkins.

For a short time, it will take extra effort on all our parts to discover who is where and in which room to find what we

need. The shifting and movement of rooms and people is a pain and yet, the good news is it means we also are changing and growing. One of the greatest challenges for religious institutions is to be adaptable – to adjust to the changing needs of the community and world around them. We like things to stay the same. We like to know that when we go to church, everything will be exactly as it was 50 years ago or even 100 years ago. But to not adapt to the changes around us – the shifting needs and directions of our community – will make us obsolete and no longer relevant to our society.

For this month, and for the next several months, let us pray for patience with one another, and let us pray for the grace to adapt to our community needs while discerning how to maintain the life-giving traditions of our Episcopal faith. May it be so.

The Rev. Susan Carter joins St. Paul's on November 1 as the associate for pastoral care. By now we have heard about her varied background and many accomplishments: professor of journalism at MSU, award-winning news broadcaster, press secretary to a governor, North Pole explorer, holder of degrees in history and law, as well as divinity (including a D.Min in preaching). But the St. Paul's News thought we would find out some other things about our newest staff member.

How did you get into this line of work? When did you feel the call to ordained ministry?

The tug to ordained ministry was a long-standing one. As with many, though, I held off answering it, in part because I didn't feel competent or worthy or prepared. I came to appreciate that any call is not based in worthiness but in faithfulness. My ordination journey began, then, in November 2004.

Is there an inspirational figure that has influenced your spirituality?

There are many, but as a contemporary, I turn most to Desmond Tutu, the Archbishop Emeritus of Cape Town, South Africa. He has been a great force for justice and through the reconciliation process encouraged all of us to acknowledge and accept our faults and apologize for them.

What is your favorite book in the Bible?

The gospels, but I switch back and forth – sometime it's John with his Greek philosophical overtones, and sometimes it's Mark with his rapid in-your-face approach. Then, there is Matthew working to make the links to the prophets of the Old Testament and Luke/Acts who takes the story out into the world.

Favorite authors, or books, old and new?

Yikes! I have been a great consumer of science fiction and now enjoy (gently) detective stories. Among my favorites: Margaret Atwood, John Updike, E. B. White.

What are some of your interests outside of church and work?

I LOVE being out in God's creation, so physical activities that are outside are cherished. They include skiing and biking, slogging (that's a step slower than jogging) and swimming. I fly an airplane when time allows (single engine) and kayak when possible.

Favorite way to relax?

See above!

Anything that might surprise us to find out about you?

No doubt, we will find many surprises in each other. The joy will be in discovering them.

What do you like most about being priest/Episcopalian?

The openness of the Episcopal Church to all who are wanting to be in a relationship with God is very dear and important to me. As a priest, I am humbled by the call to walk with people on their faith journeys, in good times and sad ones. It is a deep privilege to serve.

Financial Update

Financial Information as of September 30, 2015

September 30, 2015 is 75% of the year. Pledge income was \$260,293 for the nine months ending September 30 which is 70.5% of the 2015 budget.

The new carpet has been installed at cost \$18,685. This has been funded by the Capital Campaign.

As of September 30, 2015 \$58,227 has been transferred from various funds so operations has a net increase of \$6,189 for the year to date.

In September there was an additional \$12,576 decline in the value of the investment funds. This makes the year to date a \$16,988 decline in value.

Some Recent Vestry Actions

In recent meetings the Vestry of St. Paul's has, among other things:

- Voted to renew the contract of the Youth and Family Minister for one year, with funding sought from the Shawver Fund, as before.
- Voted to seek Shawver Fund monies for the new position of Associate Rector for Pastoral Care.
- Approved use of new marriage liturgies approved by the General Convention, including for same-sex marriages.
- Approved the design and placement of a new frame to hold banners displaying news of upcoming major events (such as Silver Bells, Christmas services, Easter services, among others.)
- Approved the use of Capital Campaign funds for new carpeting in the church and parish house.
- Appointed outgoing Vestry members as the nominating committee for new Vestry candidates to be elected at the Annual Meeting in January. Candidates need to be in place by the December Vestry meeting.
- Discussed plans and dates for the upcoming pledge drive.
- Heard that insurance will cover the \$40,000 in repair costs from the flooding in late summer, including the costs of asbestos removal and tile replacement in the music building basement.
- Purchased a new computer system with monies from the Capital Campaign Fund.
- Created the Dr. Stephen R. Lange Music Scholarship Fund, funded in part from monies raised during the retirement celebration. This fund is for scholarships for youth choristers and former choristers of St. Paul's.
- Discussed recommendations to review the Vestry committee structure to clarify the purpose and scope of committees and their reporting responsibilities.
- Began work on the 2016 budget with the assistance of Treasurer Jeff Irwin.

Minister of Music Jeff Walker to Present Organ Recital Nov. 8th

Jeff Walker will play his first organ recital at St. Paul's on **Sunday, November 8, at 3:30 PM**. The program will include works from the German and French Baroque (Bach, Buxtehude, and De Grigny); Ronald Arnatt's Fanfare, featuring the loud tuba stop (tuba is the Latin word for trumpet); a lovely Pastorale by Alexandre Guilmant, which will explore the softer tone colors of the organ; and the Sonata Eroica (heroic sonata) by Joseph Jongen. The recital is free and open to the public. A reception will follow.

Jeff notes: "Our fine instrument, built in 1950 by the Austin Organ Company of Hartford, Connecticut, is inspired by British organs of the twentieth century. In 2005 it was refurbished, and at that time a number of digital stops were added, most importantly three 32' stops in the pedal which extended the bass range of the organ down a full octave. Despite the side placement of the pipes, the organ projects into the room splendidly, and with our recently improved acoustics (thinner carpet glued directly to the wood floor) the organ sounds truly magnificent. It is ideal for accompanying the choirs and leading congregational singing. It also serves a wide variety of organ repertoire very well."

He adds, "I want to take this opportunity to express my heartfelt thanks for the wonderful welcome you have extended to me. I am honored to be your new Minister of Music."

Product pickup will be Saturday, December 5, from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM, and Sunday, December 6, from 11:30 AM to 2:00 PM, at All Saints. There is also an alternative holiday marketplace open during the pickup times.
