Financial Update

Through October 31, 2015, the church's financial condition is good for 2015. We have paid our bills timely without the need to use Perpetual Fund money.

Having said that, overall we are behind in pledge collections for 2015. If there is no increase in the portion of pledges paid in the last two months of the year we could be as much \$15,000 short in 2015 pledge revenue. Please make every effort to complete your 2015 pledge by December 31, 2015.

In October there was a \$27,074 increase in the value of the investment funds. This makes the year to date a positive amount of \$10,086.

Listen for a Change: Sacred Conversations for Racial Justice

We are pleased to announce that we have been asked by the Diocese of Michigan to be a partner site for Trinity Institute's 45th National Conference "Listen for a Change: Sacred Conversations for Racial Justice".

From January 22-25, 2016, St. Paul's will be a webcast site for a leading group of activists, scholars, authors, artists and experts on racial inequality. They will come together to hold life-giving conversations on the racial issues of our time, including structural racism, mass incarceration, and policy change.

Conference participation is open to anyone interested in a practical, theological perspective on racial equality. The live conference will be held at Trinity Church Wall Street, New York, and St. Paul's will offer all aspects of the conference in real time – where participants can submit questions for speakers via email following panel presentations.

Keynote speakers for this year's conference include: Nicholas Kristof, columnist for The New York Times; Michael Curry, presiding bishop of The Episcopal Church; Michele Norris, journalist and former host of NPR's "All Things Considered"; Eduardo Bonilla-Silva, PhD, Professor and Chair of the Sociology Department at Duke University; Victor Rios, PhD, author, speaker, and Associate Professor in the Sociology Department at UC-Santa Barbara; Kelly Brown Douglas, M.Div., PhD, Professor and Director of the Religion Department at Goucher College.

Registration information will be available mid- December. The conference is scheduled for Thursday evening, and all day Friday and Saturday.

A Taste of Thanksgiving

Every Monday a group of hardy souls arrives at St. Paul's at 9AM and stays for two hours. They take the CATA bus and come whatever the weather: rain, snow, and frigid temperatures. The number varies from 14 or so to 25 – they are our refugees from Bhutan (and now two from Myanmar, although they steadfastly say "Burma"). They come to learn about this country that has accepted them and to practice English.

As part of our Mission and Outreach Ministry, we have supported this group for more than a year – giving them tea, coffee, breads and fresh fruit as well as two bus tokens. And we also pay for interpreter in Nepalese, the language they speak. Our interpreter is a young woman, and the niece of one of our members. She, too, is a refugee, and hopes to take her citizenship exam in the near future. She is happy to earn a little money and we are happy to have her.

Bhutan is a small country nestled in the Himalayas next to Nepal, with borders on China to the north and India to the south and east. These refugees lived in the south of the country and were originally from Nepal, encouraged by the British to settle in Bhutan and farm. They differed from the Bhutanese in culture and religion. They were driven to refugee camps in the early 1990's. Most of our group spent 15 or more years in the camps before the U.S. agreed to take 60,000 refugees beginning in 2008.

This brave band of mostly elders struggles with a new country, a new language, and a new alphabet. But their eyes shine when we talk about the freedoms in the First Amendment -- religion, speech, assembly and press. They are Hindu and were persecuted for it. On Monday, November 16, we had a "Taste of Thanksgiving" party to illustrate the Thanksgiving holiday for them and to celebrate. (One of the 100 possible questions you can be asked on your citizenship exam is to "name two national holidays").

So we had turkey, pumpkin pie, cranberries, mashed potatoes and all the trimmings, and the our refugees brought spicy Bhutanese food as is their custom when invited as guests to a party. Our refugees learned about Plymouth Rock and Squanto and the first Thanksgiving feast. We all laughed about the "mistake" that named the Native Americans there on that first day "Indians." We knew we had a lot to be thankful for and as we all discover every Monday morning – we have so much more in common than we have differences.

Music Notes

The choir will open each of our Advent services with one of the great "O" Antiphons. In Catholic as well as Anglican usage, Evening Prayer (or Vespers) always includes the Song of Mary, the Magnificat (My soul doth magnify the Lord). In the last seven days of Advent that canticle is preceded by one of these special antiphons.

Written in the seventh or eighth century by monks, each begins with the exclamation "O" and ends with a plea for the Messiah to come. These antiphons are the basis of each of the seven stanzas of the hymn "O Come, O Come Emmanuel." We will sing the corresponding stanza as the presentation each Sunday. Lutheran composer Carl Schalk adapted a Mode ii plainchant to the English version of these texts.
