

Presiding Bishop calls for a season of prayer

March 29, 2016

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry has called for a season of prayer for regions of the Anglican Communion which are experiencing violence and civil strife.

"In this season of Resurrection, I call on everyone to pray for our brothers and sisters in areas where there is much burden and little hope," the presiding bishop said.

In addition, in his Easter Message 2016, Curry addressed the situation in Brussels, noting, "The truth is even as we speak this Holy Week, we do so not only in the shadow of the cross but we do so in the shadow of those who have been killed in Brussels, of those who have been wounded and maimed, of those who weep and mourn. And of a world mourning, and not too sure how to move forward."

Citing Galatians 6:2 – Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ – Presiding Bishop Curry called for prayer throughout the holy season of Easter. Beginning on April 3, the First Sunday of Easter, and proceeding through Pentecost on May 15, the Episcopal Church is asked to pray for a particular province or region:

words and the song "The from King and I" came to me on the way home from regular Monday meeting with our Bhutanese refugees. We

are getting to know them and they us...and they come from a land very near Siam (Thailand, now) We asked the group to write their stories in English using vocabulary words they had learned.

You should know that we have about 20 to 25 Bhutanese who come and, now, six refugees from MayanMar (Burma) who join in even though only one speaks Nepali-- the language of our translator. I thought you should get to know some of them.

Nar and Chandra are perhaps the oldest attendees. Nar is 72 and Chandra, his wife, is in her late 60's. Nar came from a family of 11 brothers and sisters. They were born in Bhutan, lived and married and had 14 children. Their family was sent to a refugee camp in neighboring Nepal when political and cultural trouble broke out in Bhutan. They were part of a Hindu minority that was declared "non citizens" and ousted from the country.

Both Nar and Chandra and their children spent 20 years in the camp in Nepal (and I suspect several of their children were born there). Now some of their children are spread throughout this country, and some live here in Lansing. One daughter arrived from Nepal just a week or so ago.

These two work very hard to learn about this, their new country. They struggle with a new alphabet and language and are proud to show what they have learned. They and everyone in the class on Mondays is especially fond of "WE the PEOPLE" -- the phrase writ so large on the Constitution -- to show that this country is a country of the people, not a king. They know that the Constitution is the "law of the land."



What Church Music is for

The following is excerpted from a sermon by John Andrew, XI rector of St. Thomas Church in New York. I don't think it could have been said better. This offers all of us something to ponder as we enter once again a time of transition in our music ministry.

WHAT is the purpose of a choir? It's not to perform difficult music before a silent and intimidated (or irritated) congregation. It's not there to impress the faithful. It's there to encourage the faithful to find their voices to praise God in his holiness. It is there to give the people their voice. It is what we call a ministry: it's what St. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians means when he says: "I entreat you then . . . as God has called you, live up to your calling . . . each of us has been given his gift, the due portion of Christ's bounty." You heard it read today (Ephesians 4:1-11). The ministry of music is to get the people's imagination going, to offer God something they perhaps hadn't realized they had in them. Music can take them out of themselves. It makes people cry, when they feel overwhelmed by the sheer force of its beauty. I know it's true. I confess to being vulnerable to this when a great hymn or its descant's majesty sweeps me off my feet. Just ask the boy choristers. I don't apologize for it. That's not cheap emotion. It's God's people finding their voice, their response with their uplifted hearts.

The Sudanese Well Project & OTC Medications for South Sudan

News regarding last summer's Sudanese well-digging project St. Paul's has financially supported has been slow in coming, but I now have a clearer picture of the situation.

As you may know, serious inter-tribal fighting erupted in South Sudan last year. Even though Daniel Akuol's home area of Aliab/Pulawer was spared direct involvement in the fighting, it was overrun by large numbers of refugees. This turmoil and uncertainty made digging a well impossible last summer.

Today, the conflict and influx of refugees continues; inflation is threatening to overwhelm Sudan's economy; and the goal of digging the well has become unrealistic. The local Sudanese leadership, however, has suggested a feasible alternative: create a karak instead of a well.

A karak is a traditional, hand-dug depression a few feet deep and twenty or thirty feet across which fills during annual flooding from the near-by Nile. Because Aliab is a low-lying grassland, karaks fill and retain enough water to meet the continuing needs of a local community's cattle. With a bulldozer it would be possible to create a karak of sufficient size and depth to provide dependable water for the whole community as well as its livestock. Obviously, water from a source used by cattle has to be boiled before anyone can safely use it, but this essential practice is well-understood and followed there.

Of further importance: Because bulldozing a larger than usual karak is less expensive than digging and equipping a well, the funds we have may be sufficient to create more than one of them.

staying for the summer. As he has in the past, he will be taking with him a supply of over-the-counter medications. (Incidentally, Daniel has some basic medical training.) The cost of these medications is always a problem; however, the women of St. Paul's have in the past generously purchased medications for him to take. If you would like to help again this year, the following is a list of the medications he can carry with him:

- Pepto-Bismol
- Tylenol/Acetaminophen
- Motrin
- Aleve/Advil
- Band-aids
- Pain-relieving and antiseptic creams
- Imodium
- Liquid Tylenol or Motrin for use with children

(Please stick to Daniel's list as the above items meet the most common needs and are relatively easy to take with him on the plane.)

Financial Update

Financial Information as of February 29, 2016

Pledge income was \$74,901 for the two months ending February 29, 2016. February is 16.7% of the year and this is 24.1% of the budget pledge amount. However, it should be noted that \$17,742 of this amount was paid in 2015 as prepaid 2016 pledges.

As of the end of February, we recorded \$11,399 more operating revenue then expense. This was primarily because of the pledge revenue exceeding the budget amounts.

The designated and restricted invested funds had a year to date loss in market value to \$15,228 as of February 29, 2016.

On February 15 the Vestry passed an operating budget for 2016. The budget has a potential deficit of \$33,733. If the deficit comes to pass, funding for the deficit may come from \$68,606 of unrestricted funds available at December 31, 2015.
