

### **Stewardship Focuses on Energy for 2016-17**

At our most recent meeting, your Stewardship Ministry Team decided to focus on providing you with information concerning how you can be a better steward of one of God's most precious gifts—energy. We will provide you with monthly suggestions and helpful hints in the St. Paul's Newsletter, and periodically in the Sunday bulletins.

Many of you are already doing your part as good stewards by maximizing energy efficiency in your home and neighborhoods, on your way to and from work, as well as in your work environment. We encourage you to contact Mark Rudd (<u>mrrudd57@yahoo.com</u>) with what you are doing to be a better "energy steward" so that information can be shared with others at St. Paul's.

It's that time of year where you have probably turned your furnace on. We've been blessed with an unusually warm fall, but there is a forecast of snow in the near future. Here are some questions and a few suggestions for you to consider:

- What have you done to bundle up your home to keep the heat in and the cold air out?
- Have you put your storm windows in yet? Did you use weather stripping on them, as well as your exterior doors? Or do you have two- or three-paned windows, and insulated doors?
- What do you have in terms of insulation? What is its "R," or insulating value? Do you have insulation in your attic? If so, how much? The Department of Energy recommends insulation having R-values from R<sub>3</sub>8 to R6o for your attic in our part of the country.

- Is the base plate in your basement insulated? If you have an older home, have you looked into the costs of having foam insulation blown into the sidewalls of your house? While the up-front costs might be a lot, in the long term, you will save on the cost of heating (and cooling) your home.
- Have you had your furnace serviced for this winter yet? A well-functioning furnace will not only minimize your energy use, but it may save your life. A tight house keeps the heat in, but if your furnace hasn't been serviced lately, it could produce carbon monoxide. This dangerous unseen, tasteless, odorless gas can accumulate in your body over time, causing illness, and even death. A Carbon Monoxide (CO) Detector for a gas furnace (and water heater) is vitally important to alert you if it is leaking into your air-tight home.

In the bigger picture, the more energy efficient your house is, the better for our environment. Despite the use of solar, wind, and other renewable resources for power, we still live in a world which relies heavily on pollution-producing fossil fuels. In the long run, as good stewards of the Good Lord's creation, we will need to make the switch, but that can be covered in a future article. For now, these are just a few ideas for how to make your own home more energy efficient as we begin our coldest season. Do you have other suggestions?

## **Financial Update**

Treasurer's Report as of October 31, 2016

Pledge income was \$278,793 for the ten months ending October 31, 2016. October is 83% of the year and we have collected 90% of the pledge budget.

For the month of October we recorded \$814 more expense than revenue. There were no unusually large expenses in October. The designated and restricted invested funds had a \$10,852 loss in market value in October. This brings the year to date market value gain to \$29,195. We have also collected \$10,181 in designated and restricted contributions as of October 31.

As of October 31 we have \$48,042 in the checking account. With two months to the end of 2016 we continue to be over budget in revenue and under budget in expenses.

#### TAIZE CHANTS

As Christmas quickly approaches, I would like to share with everyone some of the reflections on our music ministry for the month. First, as Advent unfolds, we will introduce some Taizé chants into the liturgy. As the Advent wreath is lighted, we will all join in singing "Wait for the Lord" – one the most popular Taizé chants for the season which will draw us more deeply in to the liturgical action. Part of the beauty of Taizé chant is that it centers our minds, calms our outside thoughts, and enables us to focus on the Holy. Throughout the upcoming liturgical year—which begins this Advent—we will be using some more Taizé chants especially during communion, where the repetition of refrains and ostinato responses will help us center our minds and hearts.

#### LESSONS AND CAROLS

On Advent IV, **Sunday, December 18 at 4:00PM**, the St. Paul Chancel Choir will present Advent Lessons and Carols in the tradition of King's College, Cambridge. This beautiful and poignant ceremony combines scripture readings with choral anthems as well as popular Advent carols as we anticipate the Incarnation of the Word made flesh. The choir will sings music by Handel, Cherubini,

Morley, and others. All are welcome, so please invite your friends and neighbors. This is a wonderful opportunity for Ecumenical worship!

#### **CHRISTMAS EVE**

Our Christmas celebrations will culminate on **Christmas Eve**. The children's choir and the youth choir will sing at the **4:00PM** service of Holy Communion, and the Chancel Choir will provide special music at the **9:00PM** service of Holy Communion.

At 8:30PM we will begin with a prelude of Christmas music featuring the Chancel Choir and our Handbell choir which will have made its premiere appearance of the year at the Silver Bells in the City celebration on Nov. 18. The Christmas Eve 9:00PM service will also be accompanied by brass quartet and organ—you won't want to miss this joyful celebration!

### **Confirmation Class - An Inquiring & Discerning Heart**

Karen Lewis+ is inviting all those interested in receiving confirmation, reception, or reaffirmation to join her for conversation and instruction.

Confirmation is a sacramental rite for those baptized at an early age (and those baptized as adults without laying on of hands by a bishop) wishing to make a public affirmation of their faith and recommit to the responsibilities of their baptism, and receive laying on of hands by a bishop.

Reaffirmation is for those who have experienced a renewal of faith or desire to renew their Christian commitment and wish to publicly reaffirm their baptismal vows.

Reception is a rite for those who have already made a mature Christian commitment in another denomination

and wish to be recognized as members of the one holy catholic and apostolic church, and be received into the fellowship of the Episcopal Church and Anglican Communion.

Only a bishop is allowed to perform these three rites, and thus, he offers opportunity in each geographical region for a number of churches to gather in one place. This special service is held during the 50 days of Easter.

### Congregational Book Study - White Trash by Nancy Isenberg

All are invited to join us in our next book study—*White Trash.* You will have plenty of time to read this tome as it is over 400 pages in length, and full of details. The good news is that the last one hundred pages are footnotes, which clues you into the research conducted for the writing of this book. If you wish to join us in our conversations, please sign up in the Merrifield Room for a copy of the book.

We will be ordering the books in mid-December so as to give you something to read on those cold, wintery days. Our book conversations will begin in February 2017. The cost of the book is \$15 and, we will provide extra copies for those who may be low on cash after holiday shopping. To give you a sense of the book's topic, below is the official book description from the author's website:

"In her groundbreaking history of the class system in America, extending from colonial times to the present, Nancy Isenberg takes on our comforting myths about equality, uncovering the crucial legacy of the ever-present, always embarrassing—if occasionally entertaining—poor white trash.

The wretched and landless poor have existed from the time of the earliest British colonial settlement. They were alternately known as "waste people," "offals," "rubbish," "lazy lubbers," and "crackers." By the 1850s, the downtrodden included so-called "clay eaters" and

"sandhillers," known for prematurely aged children distinguished by their yellowish skin, ragged clothing, and listless minds.

Surveying political rhetoric and policy, popular literature and scientific theories over four hundred years, Isenberg upends assumptions about America's supposedly classfree society-where liberty and hard work were meant to ensure real social mobility. Poor whites were central to the rise of the Republican Party in the early nineteenth century, and the Civil War itself was fought over class issues nearly as much as it was fought over slavery. Reconstruction pitted poor white trash against newly freed slaves, which factored in the rise of eugenics--a widely popular movement embraced by Theodore Roosevelt that targeted poor whites for sterilization. These poor were at the heart of New Deal reforms and LBJ's Great Society; they haunt us in reality TV shows like Here Comes Honey Boo Boo and Duck Dynasty. Marginalized as a class, white trash have always been at or near the center of major political debates over the character of the American identity.

We acknowledge racial injustice as an ugly stain on our nation's history. With Isenberg's landmark book, we will have to face the truth about the enduring, malevolent nature of class as well."


