Sunday mornings...

Sunday mornings are hectic times – both at home and church. The rush in the morning to arise, eat, dress and arrive at church on time for choir practice or acolyting, ushering, greeting, or setting up for coffee hour. This can demand significant focus and energy, particularly when the children are dragging their feet.

The same is true for our parish clergy. Sunday mornings require intense focus - are the acolytes, chalice bearers, lector, and prayer leader here? Are there any last minutes changes to the service? Last minute additions to the prayers – perhaps someone died? Is the sound system tablet on the clergy seat in case we need to adjust the volume? And after the service, we are trying to greet everyone and spend special time with any new folks who have walked through our door.

The list is endless. And often well-intentioned folks share a piece of information with one of our clergy – such as an upcoming surgery date, or so-and-so is in the hospital, or questions are asked such as "Do you have time this week to ____?" or "When will this ____?" We want to hear your news and questions but it can be a challenge for us to remember what you have said as we are trying to handle many details at the same time, and in all honestly, we are aging and forgetting more and more.

There is a good chance that if you share important info with the clergy either 30 minutes prior or 30 minutes after the service, we will not fully remember what you have said. Imagine that you are one of many offering important information in a short span of time and at times, it is hard to remember it all. And we want to! So we ask that if you wish us to remember what you have shared, that you write it on a card or piece of paper and place it in either Susan's+ or Karen's+ mail box, both of which are located outside the door of the parish office. Let Us Pray Lent Series Begins Wednesday, March 8th

Praying is not always the easiest conversation to engage in as folks often wonder if they are praying the correct way. Some think they aren't praying long enough or hard enough. Some get bored with the prayer forms they know but are hesitant to try others. Episcopalians often ponder if there are other ways to pray besides with a 1979 Book of Common Prayer in their hand. And did you know that you do not have to be on your knees to pray?

We are summoned to pray by Jesus who has provided us with the ultimate sample of prayer in The Lord's Prayer. There are many more ways to pray. Have you considered praying with icons? Or Anglican prayer beads? Is journaling something you enjoy doing? How about body movement? Or coloring? Meditating or chanting? Some find reading and meditation the best form of prayer while others speak aloud. Have you discovered which are the best ways to pray for you?

And, then, what is it we are to pray for? My own needs and those of others? How many prayers of thanksgiving


do I need to offer – do I have to have just as many as I have petitions? How will you know if God hears you? What is prayer anyways and why bother? If God already knows everything I think and need, why spend the time praying?

Prayer is simply engaging in a conversation with God; not because God needs it but because we do. There are times I wonder if God gets bored with our prayers.

Join us as we investigate various forms of prayer and discuss prayer and why we engage in it— personally and corporately. Our conversations will be lively as we ponder prayer, the why's and how's of it.

Book Study: "White Trash" or "Hillbilly Elegy"

For several months we have been promoting our upcoming congregational book study of "White Trash." The books have arrived and are in many of your hands, while some still need to pick theirs up in the church office. Some (like me) have found White Trash to be a bit of a challenge to read. While filled with well-researched information about the 400-year history of classism in our country, it can be a bit overwhelming to read. It is well worth the time, but not always easy.

For those who have found "White Trash" a bit of a challenge, we are offering an alternative book as a companion to our book study – "Hillbilly Elegy" by J.D. Vance. Below is a brief description of the book:

From a former marine and Yale Law School graduate, a powerful account of growing up in a poor Rust Belt town that offers a broader, probing look at the struggles of America's white working class, "Hillbilly Elegy" is a passionate and personal analysis of a culture in crisis—that of white working-class Americans. The decline of this

group, a demographic of our country that has been slowly disintegrating over forty years, has been reported on with growing frequency and alarm, but has never before been written about as searingly from the inside. J. D. Vance tells the true story of what a social, regional, and class decline feels like when you were born with it hung around your neck.

The Vance family story begins hopefully in postwar America. J. D.'s grandparents were "dirt poor and in love," and moved north from Kentucky's Appalachia region to Ohio in the hopes of escaping the dreadful poverty around them. They raised a middle-class family, and eventually their grandchild (the author) would graduate from Yale Law School, a conventional marker of their success in achieving generational upward mobility.

But as the family saga of Hillbilly Elegy plays out, we learn that this is only the short, superficial version. Vance's grandparents, aunt, uncle, sister, and, most of all, his

Treasurer Report for 2016

The 2016 financial report & 2017 budget was presented at the annual meeting on January 29, 2017. Following is the written portion of the financial report.

St. Paul's had a good year financially in 2016.

Over \$332,000 of pledge/non pledge revenue was booked in 2016. That is \$21,000 more than the budgeted amount for 2016.

Total operating revenues were \$384,000, including pledge revenue, in 2016. A total of \$454,000 was expended in 2016. To fund this difference we used \$82,000 from the designated and restricted funds. Included in that amount was \$40,000 from the Shawver Memorial Fund to support the salary of the Youth Coordinator and Assistant Rector. (A schedule of all funds transferred is attached on page 16 of the Financial Report).

The designated and restricted funds received \$14,000 in contributions in 2016. The designated and restricted funds also recorded \$37,000 in investment earnings in 2016. This is the fifth straight year our investments have gained in value for a five-year total gain of \$251,000.

The Capital Campaign spent \$5,000 in 2016. Since the Capital Campaign started in 2011 over \$500,000 has been expended to improve our Capital facilities. The Capital Campaign has \$8,000 of funds available.

In summary, operations spent \$70,000 more than collected. However a total of \$82,000 was transferred from designated and restricted to unrestricted operations. Also, \$1,500 was designated to set up a Sabbatical Fund, so we had a net \$10,000 increase in the unrestricted fund balance. The designated and restricted funds had a \$51,000 gain in contributions and investment earnings. We go into 2017 with over \$105,000 of cash in the bank.

For the third year in a row no Perpetual Fund money was used in 2016. The Perpetual Fund has over \$66,000 available for future use as of December 31, 2016.

The financial statements will be audited and the auditors could make changes.

Discussion of the 2017 Operating Budget:

The 2017 operating budget was approved by the Vestry. The budget presented has about the same overall pledge/non pledge revenue as 2016. While the pledges are down about \$8,000, we expect to collect at least \$8,000 more in non-pledge funds.

The operating budget shows we will expend \$107,000 more then we will collect in 2017. This will be addressed because \$71,000 of funds will be released from restriction. Also, we have a \$75,000 restricted surplus available. Accordingly, the 2017 budget is viable. In addition we do not budget for contributions to the restricted funds or the change in investment values.

A significant portion of the funds to be transferred include \$45,000 in support from the Shawver Fund to fund the Youth Coordinator and Assistant Rector positions.

An audit of the 2015 financial records is being conducted by the volunteer team of Kirk Lindquist, Bradley Deacon, Libby Richardson and Mark Johnson. Their report is expected to be completed soon.

I want to thank Theresa Milne for her excellent service as the church bookkeeper. Theresa does a great job of keeping our records in top order. In addition, Libby Richardson has been a big help assisting Theresa. Karen Lewis is also very involved and knowledgeable on the churches financial matters. I also want to thank all the Sunday pledge counters, volunteer auditors and all who help to keep our financial records in order.

mother, struggled profoundly with the demands of their new middle-class life, and were never able to fully escape the legacy of abuse, alcoholism, poverty, and trauma so characteristic of their part of America. Vance piercingly shows how he himself still carries around the demons of their chaotic family history.

Certainly you are welcome to read both books as you will find they complement each other. We will begin our book

study conversations the first Wednesday following Easter–April 19. Whether you have read only one or both of the books, we will gather as a group that evening for initial conversation and distribute discussion guides for future group studies.
