## It will be different this year

Easter is bound to feel different this year. No stained glass windows; no high altar dressed in banks of potted flowers; no brass quartet announcing the good news of the resurrection. All of the familiar 'dressings' of Easter we have come to know and love will not be present – at least not in the way we have experienced for years.

But I wonder . . . is this not what Easter is about? Newness? Joy in the gift of dislocation? Finding God in the unexpected and unknown—in the stranger on the road? Realizing a stone tomb cannot deter or restrain God's love? Nor will a collapsing brick wall define whose we are and who we are as the Body of Christ.

We have been so blessed in the last few weeks. Notes and calls and emails from near and far offering prayers of support and spaces for worship. Some shared their memories of weddings, baptisms, and funerals at St. Paul's. Others have stepped forward and offered financial and other professional resources to assist in our rebuilding efforts.

In some real sense, our Easter arrived early when a group of parishioners stood vigil overnight praying and hoping the wall would not come tumbling down. Our Easter experience of dislocation and God's unrestrained love began that day and will continue for many days to come as we grow into this new life of St. Paul's Episcopal Church.

Much like what the disciples experienced after the resurrection—we too may experience fear and anxiety; we may lose patience at the slowness of the reconstruction of some things, while experiencing apprehension at the pace

of change in other areas. We will learn new ways to trust God as we discover additional building issues throughout this process. Our community life and prayer life may be strengthened as we sit closer to each other in worship instead of our normal spreading out in the pews.

The Easter of 2017 brings us much to celebrate! It also brings us a greater awareness of what church is and how we are needed in this community. We have much work to do in the next few months. We will need to make decisions about building issues that are now apparent that were hidden before—a crisis in one area of the building helps bring awareness of other necessitated building repairs into the open. This Easter we comprehend in a very real way our obligation not only to this community of St. Paul's, but to those future generations who follow in our footsteps.

Easter will feel different this year. But that is a good thing! God is good all the time and in this disruption, God's goodness is never more evident. So let us celebrate disruption! And let us give thanks for each other and for God's gift of Jesus Christ. Alleluia! The Lord has risen indeed!

# Wonderful News to Celebrate

It seems like only yesterday—but it was really about a year ago—when we received the unexpected news that our Music Minister of only six months had resigned, with his last day being Easter Sunday. We hadn't even had a chance to get to know each other. St. Paul's, with its incredible capacity to pick itself up and move forward, said good-bye to Jeff Walker and wondered what was next.

Instead of initiating a full search, the decision was made to find and hire an individual with the gifts, skills, and talents necessary to help us move through this next music ministry transition for a 12 month period as our Acting Minister of Music. Following the one-year term, we would discern initiating a search process for a permanent Minister of Music. The interviewing process began and, as God is good all the time, we found that talented someone literally across Seymour Street, and Dr. Timothy Flynn joined us in June 2016.

Last month, your Vestry asked the Music Ministry Transition Team (the group that was responsible for the first search following Dr. Lange's retirement in 2015) to meet and provide their counsel and recommendations regarding one of two options: 1) initiate a search process

for a new Minister of Music or 2) offer the permanent position to Dr. Flynn. The team's recommendation to the Vestry was as follows:

"... the members of the team expressed their pleasure with the job Dr. Flynn has been doing as Acting Minister of Music, their desire to continue working with him, and their eager anticipation of what the future of the music program will be under Dr. Flynn's leadership...[The] team voted unanimously to recommend to the Vestry of St. Paul's Episcopal Church that Dr. Timothy Flynn be offered the permanent position of Minister of Music."

The Vestry received this recommendation at its meeting last Monday; affirmed it with their own enthusiasm; and encouraged Karen+ to offer the position to Dr. Flynn with great hopes he would accept. And he did the very next day! We are thrilled to have Tim amongst us and look forward to many years of ministry, musical programming for our community and the worship we will share. Welcome aboard permanently!!! We are planning to celebrate Tim's presence in the near-future. Details will be forthcoming soon.

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## Holy Week Worship Opportunities

Easter is one of the two major feast days of the Church—the other being Christmas. Each year, celebrating the Day of the Resurrection is essential to knowing who we are and whose we are. This is a day of new birth which is particularly meaningful as we journey through our own death and resurrection embodied in a wall of memories and stained glass window.

To fully understand Easter—to fully 'get' how much we are loved and valued by our Creator—we need to walk the path with Jesus as he moves from betrayal to death on a wooden cross to new life emerging from a hole in a rock wall. To engage in the celebration of Easter while not experiencing the suffering of a crown of thorns is to deny the fullness of God's love. Consider carefully how you can carve a few hours of time out of your normal life to sup with Jesus, to suffer with Jesus, and to greet our risen Lord.

From choir to Vestry, including wardening stints; from adult Christian education leadership to devoted service to the Sudanese ministry; from newsletter editing (Sue) to productions of Amahl and the Night Visitors (Chuck); from Mission and Outreach projects (including the ERD book sale) to Lent book reviews; from comedy skits at Cabaret to sermons from the pulpit (Chuck as the Rev. Charles W. Millar, ordained episcopal priest); from rector searches to the Lange Ensemble—they have been inspirational leaders and good and faithful servants.

Not to mention other aspects of their lives, championing civil rights, helping integrate local schools, patronizing the arts, sailing the Great Lakes (in a homemade sailboat!), growing native plants, and much more. In recent years, they have ended their annual Christmas letter by noting that they "continue to affirm that Christ is God's self-giving, creative love, incarnate and active in our relationship with each other and the world around us."

My granddaughter goes to Glencairn Elementary School in East Lansing. Many of the children who attend Glencairn came from Red Cedar Elementary, which was closed but which was the school in the East Lansing district with the most diversity. Every year they have a celebration of the nations with a parade of children wearing clothing from their country of origin. Every assembly they start with the pledge you see above. The pledge was printed on the program and I thought they wouldn't mind if I shared it.

I thought about the words of pledge as I sat at a training for helping refugees, specifically with facts and suggestions for advocacy. I thought about them on Monday as our faithful refugees [now including not just Bhutanese but people from Burma ("not Myanmar" as Po Reh forcefully says) and Afghanistan, Sudan and Somalia] They are so very grateful to be here! They love to recite the Bill of Rights and they know that the Constitution is the "law of the Land." And especially they know what it is like to live without the protections we often take for granted.

The children know....it is really very simple and they recite it often and know it by heart.

# Building Threatened following Dramatic Windstorm

The extraordinarily high winds of Wednesday, March 8, weakened the front wall of the church, and there has been a flurry of activity since then. Parishioners have been kept updated by Karen+ and the main office through regular emails.

Here, along with the e-mailed update from March 29, are a few photos of the damage and work being done to repair it.



Time for our weekly update! As I have mentioned before, things are pretty fluid here and what I may have shared with you this past Sunday has now changed. The stained glass specialist our insurance agent sent to us from New Jersey, was here this past Monday. His words of wisdom have changed a few of the pre-laid plans.

A stained glass company from Grand Rapids, Pristine Glass Company, is here as we speak numbering window panes and taping glass together in preparation for movement to New York. The entire Te Deum window will be taken down frame-by-frame starting tomorrow. The panels will be crated and shipped to a company in New York who will create an entire new frame for the window out of aluminum. The current frame is wood and has sustained substantial damage. Pretty incredible and impressive!

The stained glass window situated above the Te Deum window has been removed and will also be sent to New York for new framing. This window is much older and we suspect it was part of the original St. Paul's church. The recommendation is not to restore the window to its original place as no one can appreciate its beauty, but rather find a new place whether it be the Memorial Garden or a spot inside our facility where we can appreciate the beauty of the window. The hope is to re-create the pattern of this window in brick or limestone in its original place in the wall.

At the same time we are selecting brick colors for both the interior and exterior walls. The wall being disassembled brick-by-brick really is three walls -- and exterior brick wall, an interior brick wall, and a middle wall made of cinder block and 'junk brick'. The original bricks for both





the interior and exterior walls are no longer manufactured so it has been an adventure to select new bricks that closely match both color and texture. Imagine, if you will, the exterior wall alone is constructed with four different colors of bricks and we are trying to match each one of them. The same is also true for the interior.

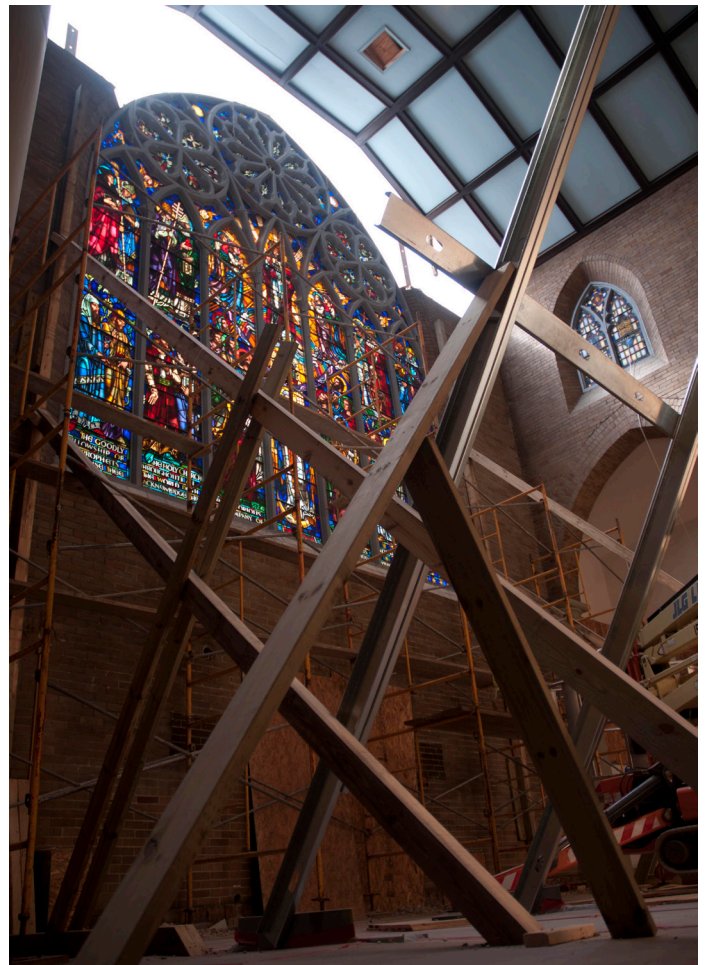
As the masons remove the current wall, many of the bricks are being saved so they can be used to help blend the new wall into the old wall at the pillars. No more bricks will be removed until the Te Deum window is safely down, crated and on its way to New York. Then the masons will return and work from both the inside and outside to remove the rest of the wall. We are still unsure as to how far down the wall must be removed. Hopefully that will be resolved this week.

We will continue to take daily photographs so that you all may see the progression of the work. Each Sunday you will have the opportunity to view either the scrapbook or the photos on the TV. My continued thanks and appreciation for those who are bringing food for the workers (and the office personnel) and for those giving of their time to assist us in maintaining a daily routine when life here is anything but routine.

## Financial Update

### Financial Information as of February 28, 2017

Total pledge income through February 28, 2017 was \$88,940. This is 28.5% of the budget. However, only \$19,966 was collected in February, and \$35,633 of the total was collected in 2016 as prepaid 2017 pledges.

We did record \$23,233 more expense than operating revenue in February 2017. Notable expenses in February include \$9,106 in utility expenses, \$2,898 in building and grounds expense, and, perhaps most importantly, we paid our quarterly general insurance invoice of \$7,225. For the two months ending February 28 we have recorded an operating gain of \$8,529.

The designated and restricted invested funds had a \$14,498 gain in market value in February, bringing the year to date gain to \$27,319.

At February 28, 2017 there was \$85,146 of cash in the bank.

It is my understanding our insurance company will pay for the entire cost of the repair to the south wall after we pay a \$1,000 deductible.

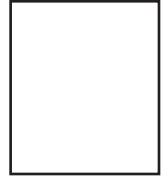
