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Expect the Unexpected!

Well, we did it! With significant effort and some very hard working folks in a very short time period, we were able to celebrate Easter in our restored sanctuary. I know, we are still waiting for the miraculous return of the Te Deum window and its frame, but I think the billboard insert works just fine for now. My thanks to the incredible folks at Laux Construction who told me they could do it—I didn't believe them for a minute—and they pulled it off. Talk about an Easter surprise!

I do not know when the real window will return. It seems the folks in New Jersey struggle with communication skills but we do trust and know it will come back to us one day soon. In the meantime, work on the building continues. A new fire alarm system will be installed the week of April 9th as ours is so old they advised us that the case to the alarm is a collectible! The new system is priced at over \$11,000. We have finally completed the mold and asbestos abatement in three separate spaces in the undercroft to the tune of over \$60,000 – the removed the final air quality equipment this week.

Patching of ceilings need to continue in the cloister hallway; lighting changes, pew repairs, etc. are on the list. The next big undertaking is our parking lot – it is sinking and the sewer pipes are in need of replacement – this project will begin July 9th and continue for the next two months until the end of August. There will be no entry into St. Paul's through our rear parking lot door – all will need to enter through the front doors of either the parish house or the Memorial Garden. We have received a \$10,000 grant

from the Trustees of the Diocese; a \$5,000 grant from the Diocesan Council; and a \$145,000 loan to help pay for this project which will cost close to \$200,000 (including the engineering).

We have come so far and the work continues. With this newly restored building we are now called to prayerfully consider how we are to use it in ministry to our community. This beautiful building is meant to be shared with others – not only in worship but in ministry with others. What and how this will be is for us now to decide. This is our task during the next several months and my hope is all will offer their thoughts. Nothing is impossible! We have learned to expect the unexpected! Thanks be to God!

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To kneel or to stand, that is the question

For the past year, we have been unable to kneel during our worship services. We have learned to stand or sit for prayers and stand to receive communion. Throughout this time, we have discovered that God is present no matter what our posture might be, and the sacrament is still valid.

Upon returning to the sanctuary, each of us will have the opportunity to choose whether to kneel or to stand: for the prayers and to receive communion. As good Anglicans, let's check what has been said in our tradition regarding kneeling. The following statement from the first Book of Common Prayer (1549) summarizes the Anglican position on ceremonies:

"As touching kneeling, crossing, holding up of handes, knocking upon the brest, and other gestures: they may be used or left as every mans devocion serveth without blame."

This statement gave folks permission to do whatever their own personal piety called for, as long as it was done with reverence.

In early times, the Greeks and Romans rejected kneeling. They said that kneeling was unworthy of a free man, unsuitable for the culture of Greece, something that only barbarians did.

In the early church, and in the Jewish worship tradition before that, a person knelt for private prayer but stood for corporate prayer. People prayed with their hands lifted up in the "Orans Position". Soon a pattern developed with private prayers and some public prayers during Lent and Advent – one could kneel as a sign of penitence and one

could stand during the Great Thanksgiving as a sign of joy and celebration. The Council of Nicea decreed that it was a sin to kneel during Eastertide. (Yikes!)

In the Middle Ages, people no longer understood the words of the Latin liturgy, so they offered private prayers during it and naturally knelt for these. Sitting was not an option because churches had no seats until the 16th century. The change from standing to kneeling came about through the omission of a command to rise after a short period appointed for silent kneeling prayer. It became customary after the Gloria in excelsis to call the people to prayer and summon them to kneel for private devotions; this was then followed by the invitation to stand. By the twelfth century the period for silent prayer had been eliminated and, as the command to stand was no longer given, the people were left kneeling. (Think about that one – our practice of kneeling for so much of the service is due to some person simply forgetting to tell us to stand.)

Later on, the classic Anglican formula was "Sit for instruction, kneel for prayer, and stand for praise." Study of the early Church customs has changed this formula somewhat to "Sit for instruction, kneel for private or penitential prayer, and stand for corporate prayer and praise." This rule, however, always has many exceptions. Our 1979 Book of Common Prayer leaves it open to what we do for many of the prayers and to receive communion.

Basically, as good Anglicans, we are able to stand or kneel for prayers – and stand or kneel for communion. What matters most is that the posture you choose, enables you to fully participate in that portion of worship.

St. Paul's Hosts the Diocesan 2018 Ministry Fair

On **Saturday, May 5, 2018**, the good folks of St. Paul's will host the annual diocesan-wide Ministry Fair. The theme for this year continues our diocesan initiative on equity, diversity and inclusion, Waters of Reconciliation, Turning Again to Christ. We were to host this event in 2017, however if you remember, we were in the midst of dissembling a wall and stained glass window.

This year's Ministry Fair offers numerous workshops that appeal to a wide-variety of interests and ministry including; Partnering to Meet the Needs of Our Autistic Neighbors, Debunking Immigration Myths, Living into Loving Relationships in Christian Community, Why is it so Hard to Talk about Faith?, etc. This is a great opportunity for us to attend formational workshops that will assist us in our ministry to our community.

In addition to workshops, the keynote speaker is The Rev. Melanie Mullen, Director of Reconciliation, Justice and Creation Care for the Episcopal Church. She leads the church's work on domestic poverty, and assists the Episcopal Church staff in relation to racial reconciliation and justice, domestic poverty, stewardship of creation, and the United Thank Offering.

How Shall we be Remembered?

At 3:30PM on Sunday, May 20th, we will insert into the front wall of St. Paul's our new time capsule. It will be placed into the exact same spot from which we removed the lead box placed there during Eastertide 1913. Our new time capsule is constructed of state-of-the-art steel with rubber seals — in fact the capsule includes its own plastic gloves for use by whomever opens the capsule one hundred years from now — 2118!

What are we to place inside this capsule? What small remnants of our life will let folks one hundred years from now understand who we are? What our lives are like? The joys and challenges of the Episcopal Church? Of St. Paul's? The time capsule is not large so whatever we place inside, must be small in nature.

Supporting Undocumented Minor Refugees

At a recent monthly meeting, St. Paul's Mission & Outreach Committee got to know Michelle Haskell and the work she does at Samaritas (formerly Lutheran Social Services) with refugee youth who are aging out of foster care. Samaritas's Unaccompanied Refugee Minors program works with children and youth who have arrived in refugee camps—a pretty horrible place to be under any circumstance—with no adult family member. These youth are typically 14 to 18 years old, from countries all over the world, having experienced the unimaginable trauma of war, famine, and loss. They go through all the processing to enter the U.S. that any refugee does, and Samaritas works to place them in foster families.

Mission & Outreach chose to assist Samaritas with supplies for the boxes of household items that it gives to each

youth when they move into independent living. We are especially drawn to this program as a way of continuing the work started at St. Paul's several years ago by the late Deacon Bill Fineout, who was passionate about supporting youth aging out of foster care and into independent living.

Cards with items that we'll be collecting will be available on a table in the Merrifield Room. Items range from new pillows and sheet sets to smaller things like a toothbrush or silverware or can opener. We have already donated quite a bit of bedding from the Needs Closet, and we'll continue to collect items for Samaritas all year long. Family Resource: Quiet Power by Susan Cain

Are you a quiet teen, know a quiet child, or even just know a quiet kid? In today's society that prefers outgoing personalities, being an introvert can often mean being misunderstood. Susan Cain's bestseller, Quiet: The Power of Introverts in a World that Can't Stop Talking, had such welcome response that she wrote a follow-up specifically for kids and teens. Quiet Power: The Secret Strengths of Introverts is exactly the book I wish I had read during adolescence.

Cain's guide goes beyond navigating social situations to staying true to one's self while even harnessing the strengths of being an introvert. The real-life stories are easily relatable for youth. The "Manifesto For Introverts" at the beginning sets a great stage for the advice that follows it.

One of the needs of introverts that Cain emphasizes is having "safe spaces -calm retreats for relaxing and recharging," also known as a "restorative niche." Explained further, "a. restorative niche allows you to return to your true self.....Going to this place is like pressing our restart button." As a faith community, we honor the need for a restorative niche by honoring the need for a weekly Sabbath. My hope is that St. Paul's youth may also find in their church a place of refuge from the hustle and bustle of their weekly lives.

Parents may find the "Quiet With Family" chapter and "A Guide For Parents" section in the back particularly helpful. I also recommend Susan Cain's TED Talks.
