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New Book Study - Diana Butler Bass' Grateful

Gratitude is not just giving thanks for blessings, birthday gifts, or compliments. Being grateful is a way of living which can be a challenge in this time of seemingly unending chaos and anger. What would it be like for us, the good folks of St. Paul's, to behave gratefully every day. To adopt acts of gratefulness as our way of living. We have much to be grateful for – the saints who have gone before us gifting us with this incredible facility – our living saints who are generational members who know and carry the legacy of the St. Paul's community – and our newest saints, the little ones who will carry on God's ministry in the future.

I invite you to join me in reading *Grateful* as we prepare to spend the next year living gratefully as a spiritual community. Let us allow God to transform us as we have worked so hard to transform our worship space. In what ways might we live gratefully – as individuals and as a community? We will gather for a four-week study – with your choice of meeting at noon on Mondays or Tuesday evenings at **6:30pm**. Child care will be available on Tuesday evenings. The following review of *Grateful* from GoodReads gives you a sense of the book we have chosen for our study.

"More and more people are finding God beyond the walls of traditional religious institutions, but these seekers often miss the church community itself, including its shared spiritual practices such as gratitude. While four out of five Americans have told pollsters they feel gratitude in

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their daily lives, cultural commentator and religion expert Diana Butler Bass finds that claim to be at odds with the discontent that permeates modern society.

There is a gap, she argues, between our desire to be grateful and our ability to behave gratefully—a divide that influences our understanding of morality, worship, and institutional religion itself. In *Grateful*, Bass challenges readers to think about the impact gratitude has in our spiritual lives, and encourages them to make gratitude a "difficult and much-needed spiritual practice for our personal lives and to make a better world." *Grateful* is partially an individual, emotional response to our circumstances, but research has shown that what we often miss is how much more it is a communal, actionable response. Bass examines this more unexpected experience of gratitude, and reveals how people and communities can practice it and thrive, whether or not they are part of a traditional religious community."

I encourage all of you to participate in this book study. It has the potential to transform you spiritually and change how our community relates to God and the world. If you cannot join one of our groups, but wish to read along, let me know. Blessings to you and yours, Karen+

Highlights from the September 17th Vestry Meeting

- K. Lewis+ reviewed the structure of the 4C's Corporation. At the last meeting snow removal was discussed and the addition of bicycle rack(s) was denied.
- K. Lewis+ continues in her 6th year as a facilitator for Fresh Start.
- K. Lewis+ explained the process for the election of a new Bishop. The Diocese is currently in the Profile stage. The Profile will be published nationally on October 1.
- Jackie Womble will continue her role as Christian Formation Director through 2018.
- Parish wide book read: Grateful by Diana Butler Ross will begin in September. Grateful and its discussion will kick off a yearlong Heritage Project. An oral history of St. Paul's will be collected.
- The Audit Committee is Kirk Lindquist, Margaret Schulte and Claudia Hamlin.
- Stewardship Pledge Drive is being organized.
- Ministry Teams Discussion focused on volunteerism and the lack of commitment. Various ideas are being explored.
 In addition to Mission and Out Reach, Communication and Community Life teams were identified as important and a priority. Vestry members will be suggesting ideas at the October meeting.
- Bishop Gibbs last official visitation to St. Paul's will be Nov. 4. One service at 10 am with confirmations, baptism and rededication of our church will take place. Plans for a luncheon, decorations, and a gift are taking place.
- K. Lewis+ announced that the Diocese of Western Michigan will use our sanctuary for their annual convention Eucharist.
- Coming event planning Potluck September 30, Bless the Pets October 7, Silver Bells November 16.



Yes, the window is done! And it looks great, in fact, so great that some suggest better than ever before. The restoration has given our century-old building an interior face-lift, a new parking lot and new life for many generations to come. There are still a few projects we must complete – installation of new entrance doors into the cloister from our parking lot as they are rusting out; installation of the trefoil stained glass window in our Memorial Garden; repair of the granite steps outside our Memorial Garden entrance door; plaster repairs to the cloister ceiling, and a number of smaller projects. But the big projects are completed. The rest no longer seem overwhelming.

Our new Facilities ministry team will be tasked with overseeing and providing maintenance to all of our buildings so that never again will we have to engage in a project as extensive as this — unless the unforeseen happens once again. In gratitude for the legacy our ancestors have left to us with these facilities, we will strive to be good stewards of them for decades to come.

St. Paul's SP21Restore committee has come to an end as its task to raise over \$750,000 has been achieved. For that, for their hard work, we express our gratitude. But... we need you to continue to pay your pledges. As often happens in the summer, many fall behind in payment of their pledges. Although we are sound financially, we do have \$380,000 in diocesan loans to re-pay. We were blessed by the generosity of the Diocesan Council in offering such loans and we must be faithful in their repayment. We give thanks for your generosity of giving to both our annual operating budget and our SP21Restore campaign.

At the same time, it offers a meaningful way to connect our Scripture readings with our eucharistic prayer. We will do this until the season of Advent. MISSION AND OUTREACH MINISTRY

The week of September 17th through 24th St. Paul's hosted Refuge Lansing — a story-telling project about refugees. We know other stories more intimately from our own "conversation group" of mostly Bhutanese that has met here Monday mornings from 9 to 11 am for the past 4 years.

The group began with 18 or so older men and women who took a bus from their relocation apartments at Jolly & Waverly. They came in rain, snow, sleet or in heat of summer. We paid a translator of Nepalese, the language most spoke. That became a challenge as there were few translators available...until we recruited their young adult children working part-time or going to LCC. All of the refugees had medical problems....some more serious than others. We gave them coffee, tea, fruit and pastries or breads. We gave them 2 bus tokens every week. We taught them about this country and what they would need to know to become a citizen. They taught us about their food and life in Bhutan and Nepal and their culture.

Most of the group were Hindu and had come from an agrarian part of Bhutan; most did not have much education. Originally the "Lhotshampas" or "southerners" were of Nepalese origin brought in to work on highways and railroads in the early 20th century. They maintained their language, religion and culture and worked on their small farms. In the early 1990's the king of Bhutan declared that they were no longer citizens of Bhutan. More 100,000 refugees were sent to Nepal to live in UN refugee camps. The UN hoped that Nepal would accept these people eventually; that did not happen. In 2007, the UN began the process of resettling the refugees to many countries, of which one was the United States.

Twice our group had been told they were unwanted and had no rights; twice they were "resettled." We discovered that most of our group had spent 20 years or more in a camp. They described it having barbed-wire fences and poor conditions. Their actions were limited. Many of their children or grandchildren were born in the camps.

They were earnest and hard-working, struggling to learn a new alphabet and language late in life. They were stunned at the concepts that are the foundation of our democracy; they were stunned at the vagaries of English like "read" the past tense of the verb and "red" the color... both pronounced the same! They flourished and brought

younger people to the group and refugees from other countries. Somehow it all worked. Most of our group has found work or moved to be with other family members who are in other states. The "conversation group" mission succeeded.

We have a temporary "hold" on forming another group as only 6 refugees from any country have been resettled in Lansing in the last 6 months.

Much has been made of the Bhutanese government campaign to attract tourists announcing that the "Gross National Happiness" is more important than the Gross National Product" in Bhutan. Unless, of course, you are those "Lhotshampas."

What is Maplewood Women's Shelter?

The City Rescue Mission is a Lansing Christian nonprofit organization that was founded in 1911 and serves the homeless and those in need of shelter. They provide faith, hope, counseling and case management. 86% of the City Rescue Mission's budget goes to Program and Services! They are 100% funded by private donations. Housing for 26,971 has been provided in the course of a year. In 2006 the City Rescue Mission began to renovate the old Maplewood school. It opened in 2010 as a shelter for Women and Children with 35 available beds. Now capacity is close to 100 with an average of 74 women and children per night. A list of their needs is available in their newsletter.

St. Paul's Altar Guild began supporting Maplewood about 7 years ago by donating unused toiletries. Personal care items for women and children are being collected and given to Maplewood. Homeless and needy women, many with children, benefit from our donations, such as personal care amenities frequently found by travelers in their hotel room. Small samples that can be purchased at grocery and drug stores. **Donations must be new and unopened.** Examples include: soap, shampoo, lotion, hair conditioners, toothpaste, combs, deodorant, etc.

There is a shopping bag on the Needs Table in the cloister where you may place your donations. When the bag is full, the contents are delivered to Maplewood as a gift from St. Paul's.

One of the faith outreaches we have at St. Paul's is the Sunday morning greeters. We can extend our faith by welcoming our fellow parishioners and visitors each week. Altar Flowers Add to Our Worship

Altar flowers beautify the sanctuary and the chapel of our church, and are a gift to God and those who attend our worship services. The cost of altar flowers is funded through generous donations to our flower fund and are not a line item in our church budget. Due to a number of factors impacting costs, the cost of altar flowers is on the rise. Multiple people/families can make a contribution for any given week and dedications will be included in the bulletin. This way, no one person would have to bear the cost for an entire week. A contribution for flowers is a meaningful way to honor or remember a loved one. It is also tax deductible.

We no longer carry over dedications from year to year. Please have your requests in the office by the Monday prior to the Sunday of your dedication. No altar flowers are provided if no dedication has been made for a given

Sunday. The altar flower ministry is self-sustaining and each week must have a minimum of an \$70 contribution. Currently, If no dedication has been submitted for a given Sunday, there will be no flowers.

We are looking at ways to make a change to how we arrange for flowers on the altar. Please contact Theresa Milne if you would like to be a part of an Altar Flower Ministry.

All Saint's Sunday is November 4th and the same date as Bishop Gibb's final visit with our parish. This is the date we will rededicate the Te Deum window. Please submit altar flower forms for All Saint's Sunday by October 28, 2018.
