

Celebration of the Festival of Epiphany & Holy Eucharist Epiphany Lessons and Carols January 7, 2024 10:00am

Epiphany celebrates the appearance of God's glory in the world through the birth of Jesus, our Emmanuel (God with us), and the revelation of the incarnation to the Gentiles, and indeed the whole of creation. It has been marked since the 3rd century with a Feast Day on the 6th of January and celebrated in both East and West in a rich variety of ways. In the Western Church, the emphasis has been on the nativity itself and the acknowledgement of Christ's sovereignty over all through the visit of the Magi bringing their gifts of frankincense, gold and myrrh. The revelation of his true nature is echoed by the words of the prophet Simeon, the *Nunc Dimittis*, at the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (February 2) that marks the end of the season of Epiphany.

The Greek word epiphany means literally 'sudden appearance' and refers above all to the 'manifestation' of a god. It is the moment and the means by which we see that Jesus is so much more than a good human being, a wise teacher and a moral example but in fact God made man, the Word became flesh. It is in this sense that Simeon declares him to be 'salvation' and 'a light to lighten the Gentiles' and that later Jesus calls himself 'the Light of the World', and so the symbolism of light pervades both this season and our service. Christ calls us out of darkness and into light, so that we may recognize the imprints of his divine fashioning in all creation. We pray that our eyes may be opened to see his glory: to have reverence for the whole of creation and respect for every person, for all are made in the image and likeness of God.

The Epiphany in the early Church was a major celebration, second only to Easter. It highlighted manifestations (or "epiphanies") of God in Jesus Christ: the recognition of the Christ Child by the Magi, Simeon's recognition of the infant Jesus to be the Messiah when presented in the temple, and the revealing of Jesus in the Spirit as God's beloved child at his baptism in the Jordan.

FIRST LESSON ISAIAH 60:1-6, 9

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn. SECOND LESSON MATTHEW 1:18-23

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, 'Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins.' All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: 'Look, a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him 'Emmanuel', which means, 'God is with us'.'

'TWAS IN THE MOON OF WINTERTIME

THE HURON CAROL -- The First American Christmas Carol Adapted by Roz Abisch

In the wild north country of the New World, in the land of forests and lakes, there lived a great Indian tribe called the Hurons.

These people of the north woods thought the world rested upon the back of a very large turtle. They believed that the sun disappeared each night into a tunnel in the earth, only to rise from the other end next morning.

To keep them safe from harm and evil, the Hurons made charms out of beavers' teeth and fish bones, out of odd-shaped pebbles and splinters of wood. Their god was a Great Spirit who lived in the sky. He was known to them as Gitchi Manitou. And he watched over forests and lakes and man and beast alike.

Into this new land of hunters and warriors, into this place of strange spirits and charms, came a French Jesuit missionary by the name of Jean deBreuf. Father Jean lived with the Hurons and learned their language and customs. They welcomed him into their lodges as a nephew to the old people, a faithful brother to those of his own age, and an uncle to the children.

Father Jean hoped to lead the sons of the forest to the teachings of the gentle Master. In their own language, he told them the story of the cross. And there, in the woodlands of the north, he spoke of that night of nights – when long ago Jesus was born...

Have courage, you who are humans. Jesus, He is born.

Behold, it has fled, the spirit who had us as prisoner. Do not listen to it, as it corrupts our minds, the spirit of our thoughts. They are spirits, coming with a message for us, the sky people. They are coming to say, 'Come on, be on top of life, rejoice!' 'Mary has just given birth, come on, rejoice.' 'Three have left for such a place; they are men of great matter.'

'A star that has just appeared over the horizon leads them there.' 'He will seize the path, a star that leads them there.' As they arrived there, where He was born, Jesus. The star was at the point of stopping, He was not far past it. Having found someone for them, He says, 'Come here.' Behold, they have arrived there and have seen Jesus.

They praised a name many times saying, 'Hurray, He is good in nature.'
They greeted Him with respect,
Oiling His scalp many times, saying,
'Hurray!'
'We will give to Him honour to His name.'
'Let us oil His scalp many times, show reverence for Him,

As He comes to be compassionate with us.' It is providential that you love us, and think 'I should make them part of My family.'

FOURTH LESSON MATTHEW 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage."

When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'" Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.





And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Savior of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.


