THE SERMON

THE NICENE CREED




And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

THE COMMUNION OF THE PEOPLE

All God's people are cordially invited to God's table, including children. Gluten-free wafers are available: please indicate to the priest that you require this alternative. We will be offering wine from the common cup to those who wish to receive in this manner. The chalice bearer will thoroughly wipe the space from which you drank prior to offering the cup to the next communicant.

Another alternative to receiving the wine from the common cup is through intinction. The priest will place the wafer in your hand; the chalice bearer will pick up the wafer, dip it into the wine, and replace it on your palm. No one is allowed to intinct with their own hand/fingers. This safe guards all who use the common cup. If you wish to receive communion in only one kind (bread), know that you have received full communion.

Those who are not baptized or those who do not wish to receive communion are welcome to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest. The ushers will guide you. If you are unable to come forward and wish to receive communion in your pew, please let one of the ushers know.

What is Autism? Autism, or autism spectrum disorder (ASD), refers to a broad range of conditions characterized by challenges with social skills, repetitive behaviors, speech and nonverbal communication. According to the Centers for Disease Control, autism affects an estimated 1 in 36 children and 1 in 45 adults in the United States today.

We know that there is not one type of autism, but many. Autism looks different for everyone, and each person with autism has a distinct set of strengths and challenges. Some autistic people can speak, while others are nonverbal or minimally verbal and communicate in other ways. Some have intellectual disabilities, while some do not. Some require significant support in their daily lives, while others need less support and, in some cases, live entirely independently.

St Paul's welcomes all to our worship and community life. It is our hope that all will find this a safe place to worship and develop a relationship with God. April is Autism Awareness Month, and we give thanks for those in our community who live with autism. Our goal is to create a sensory room in the Sunday School wing for anyone who will need a safe and calming space for those with autism who may need it.

Noisy Offering: Our Noisy Offering recipient will be the House of Promise for the months of April-June. House of Promise provides women survivors of sexual abuse and sex trafficking a safe place to heal and recover from the destructive patterns of abuse. They do this through training, counseling, and helping young girls/women relearn basic skills so they can rebuild their lives and reintegrate into society.
